



SUPERHERO SMACKDOWN

WITH OTTAWA COMICCON JUST AROUND THE CORNER, ROGER COLLIER PROFILES FOUR Hardcore FANS (AND CHECKS OUT THEIR SUPERHUMAN COSTUMES)

I had been standing in line at the first Ottawa Comiccon for an hour, reddening in the unusually hot May sun, when it dawned on me: I was a pretender. Yes, I collected comic books as a kid, and I still go to all the superhero movies. Sure, a sizable portion of my bookshelf is dedicated to Philip K. Dick and George R.R. Martin. True, I've seen every episode of *Battlestar Galactica*, *The Walking Dead*, and even *Firefly*, the short-lived but much-adored space western.

But I was not a true fan. Not of science fiction, fantasy, superheroes, or any other genre represented at the CE Centre (now the Ernst & Young Centre). I looked at the line, which seemed to stretch to infinity (and beyond), and decided to bail. Not worth it. William Shatner would have to get through the day without me. Of course, the fact that I was wearing a T-shirt instead of a costume also made it doubly obvious that I was merely a casual fan. It was a Superman T-shirt, but still. No hardcore fan would attend Comiccon in civilian attire.

Before leaving, though, I wandered around and chatted with real fans about their costumes. I talked to Starfleet captains, Klingons, time travellers, Jedi, alien predators, X-men, Watchmen, and Spidermen. I met Supergirl, shook hands with Darth Maul, and took a picture of Princess Leia in a leather-and-metal bikini (for journalistic purposes).

This year I took my research a step further. I tracked down a few of the 30,000 or so fans expected at the sophomore edition of Ottawa Comiccon (May 10 to 12). We are in a golden age of fandom, thanks to the Internet and, in particular, to social media. Thankfully, Facebook also makes it easier than ever to find mega-fans of all stripes.

So I sat down with these guys and gals in coffee shops and pubs around town to find out why they were so passionate about *Star Trek* or *Doctor Who* or whatever. I also grilled them on their knowledge of trivia about their genre of choice to determine whether they were, in fact, true fans. Turns out that, unlike me, they were all the real deal.


Why Who?: "It has a lot of good characters, a lot of good storylines. It's a little cheesy sometimes, but it's fun to get into."
